#### Directors' Report

For the year ended 31 December 2015

The Directors present their report on the affairs of Eko Electricity Distribution Plc ("the Company"), together with the financial statements and auditor's report for the year ended 31 December 2015.

#### Principal Activity and Business Review

Eko Electricity Distribution Plc ("the Company") was incorporated in Nigeria on November 8, 2005 as a public limited liability company to take over as a going concern, the electricity distribution activities and related business of the Power Holding Company of Nigeria ("PHCN") within the Eko zone, which comprised of 11 districts namely Apapa, Ajele, Agbara, Orile, Ojo, Festac, Ibeju, Ijora, Islands, Lekki and Mushin districts. However during the year, some districts were merged together reducing the number of districts to 8 namely; Festac, Ijora, Lekki, Ojo, Island, Apapa, Mushin and Agbara/Badagry districts.

As part of the Federal Government of Nigeria's ("FGN's") initiative to transform the power sector, the Nigerian Electricity Regulatory Commission (NERC) was established in October 2005 as required under the Electric Power Sector Reform Act (EPSRA) 2005. NERC is Nigeria's independent regulatory agency for the Nigerian electricity industry comprising generation, transmission and distribution sectors and regulates the activities of the Company.

In 2013, the FGN completed its planned privatization of the electricity sector effectively handing over 5 generation and 10 distribution companies to new owners under various share sale agreements. As a result of this, 60% equity interest in the Company was acquired by a Nigerian Company, West Power and Gas Ltd. ("WPG"). In 2008, NERC introduced a Multi-Year Tariff Order (MYTO) as the framework for determining the industry pricing structure and this forms the basis of revenue earned by the Company after taking into consideration changes as applicable per the Transitional Electricity Market (TEM) rules as issued by NERC via Order number 136 dated 29 January 2015 and effective 1 February 2015. The TEM rules were amended on 18 March 2015 and the amended rules became effective 1 April 2015.

During the year, the Company's revenue increased by 25% from №40.76 billion to №50.93 billion while gross profit increased by №3.24billion from №9.39 billion in the prior year to №12.63 billion in the current year. Increase in revenue is as a result of increased availability of energy for distribution in the current year compared to prior year as well as improved efforts to bring more customers into the billing net.

# 1. Deeds of assignment of pre-completion receivables and liabilities

The Company signed a deed of assignment of pre-completion receivables and liabilities with the Nigerian Electricity Liability Management Company Limited (NELMCO) effective 31 October 2013. As part of the privatization initiative and the restructuring of the Nigerian power sector, NELMCO was established to take over and manage the stranded assets and liabilities in the Power

### (a) Pre-Completion receivables

Per the Deed of Assignment of pre-completion receivables, all the trade receivables of the Company as at 31 October 2013 were transferred to NELMCO without recourse. Further interpretation accorded to the definition of pre-completion receivables by NERC expanded this to include cash and cash equivalents held as at 31 October 2013.

### (b) Pre-Completion liabilities

Per the Deed of Assignment of pre-completion liabilities, all liabilities and contingent liabilities of the Company as at 31 October 2013 were transferred to NELMCO subject to certain terms and conditions, which management believes do not limit the transfers.

On the basis of this agreement, management derecognised qualifying assets and liabilities as at 31 October 2013 from the 2013 financial statements.

## 2. Technical Agreement with Related Party

The Company entered into an operations, management and maintenance contract with WPG Services Limited (a related party) for the provision of local, top level and expatriate staff to enable EKEDP meet the performance standard in the Performance Agreement entered into with BPE. See

### Geographical Presence

To enable the Company operate within the Eko Zone where it distributes electricity, it has 8 districts excluding the head office. Each business unit is headed by a business manager who reports to the leadership team based at the head office.

### Property, plant and equipment

Information relating to changes in property, plant and equipment is provided in Note 15 to the financial statements.

### Charitable Contributions

No contributions or donations was made to charitable organisations during the year (2014: Nil). In accordance with Section 38(2) of the Companies and Allied Matters Act of Nigeria, the Company did not make any donation to any political association, or for any political purpose in the course of the year (2014: Nil).

Events after the reporting period have been disclosed in Note 30 to the financial statements.

### **Employment and Employees**

## (a) Employment Consultation and Training

The Company places considerable value on the involvement of its employees in major policy matters and keeps them informed on matters affecting them as employees and on various factors affecting the performance of the Company. This is achieved through regular meetings with employees and consultations with their representatives. Training is conducted for the Company's employees as the need arises.

Management, professional and technical expertise are the Company's major assets. The Company continues to invest in developing such skills. The Company has in-house training facilities, complemented, when and where necessary, with external training for its employees.

### (b) Dissemination of Information

In order to maintain shared perception of our goals, the Company is committed to communicating information to employees in a fast and effective manner, as possible. This is considered critical to the maintenance of team spirit and high employee morale.

## (c) Employment of physically challenged persons

The Company has 5 physically challenged persons in its employment (2014: 6). Applications for employment by physically challenged persons are always fully considered, bearing in mind the respective aptitudes and abilities of the applicants concerned. In the event of members of staff Company continues and that appropriate training is arranged. It is the policy of the Company that training, career development and promotion of physically challenged persons should, as far as possible, be identical with that of other employees.

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#### (d) Employee Health, Safety and Welfare:

The Company places a high premium on the health, safety and welfare of its employees in their places of work. To this end, the Company has various forms of insurance policies, including workmen's compensation and group life insurance, to adequately secure and protect its employees. It is the Company's goal to ensure that incident free safety record in operations is amongst the best, both locally and globally, upon which it has set its safety policy.

#### Auditor

Messrs. KPMG Professional Services, having satisfied the relevant corporate governance rules on their tenure in office have indicated their willingness to continue in office as auditors to the Company. In accordance with Section 357 (2) of the Companies and Allied Matters Act of Nigeria therefore, the Auditors will be re-appointed at the next annual general meeting of the Company without any resolution being passed.

#### 1 Reporting entity

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Eko Electricity Distribution Plc ("the Company") was incorporated in Nigeria on November 8, 2005 as a public limited liability company to take over as a going concern, the electricity distribution activities and related business of the Power Holding Company of Nigeria ("PHCN") within the Eko zone, which comprised of 11 districts namely Apapa, Ajele, Agbara, Orile, Ojo, Festac, Ibeju, Ijora, Islands, Lekki and Mushin districts. However during the year, some districts were merged together reducing the number of districts to 8 namely; Festac, Ijora, Lekki, Ojo, Island, Apapa, Mushin and Agbara/Badagry districts.

The Company supplies electricity within the captive regions above based on a licence granted to it by the Nigerian Electricity Regulatory Commission (NERC). The licence is for a period of 15 years and expires in 2028 with an option to renew for another 10 years. Based on the terms and conditions of the licence and regulations as contained in the Electrical Power Sector Reform Act (EPSRA) 2005, the Company is a monopoly within its geographical coverage area and operates under a price control regime known as the Multi Year Tariff Order (MYTO). As a result of the privatization of the power sector, the business activity of the Company during the year was governed by "the Interim Electricity Market Rules for the period between completion of privatization and the start of the Transitional Electricity Market (TEM) of the Nigerian Electricity Supply Industry (NESI)", and the TEM Rules which became effective from 1 February 2015.

Effective 1 November 2013, West Power and Gas Ltd a Nigerian Company, acquired 60% interest in the Company thereby acquiring control of the Company. The remaining 40% shareholding is held by Bureau of Public Enterprises (32%) and Ministry of Finance Incorporated (8%). The acquisition of the 60% interest in the Company was as a result of the privatization initiative of the power sector embarked on by the Federal Government of Nigeria.

#### 2 Basis of Accounting

Details of the Company's accounting policies are included in Note 7.

## 3 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Nigerian Naira (N), which is the Company's functional currency. All amounts stated in Naira have been rounded to the nearest thousand, unless otherwise indicated.

### 4 Use of judgments and estimates

In preparing these financial statements, management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the Company's accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to estimates are recognised prospectively.

### 6 Measurement of fair values

Some of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities.

The Company has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The Chief Financial Officer (CFO) has overall responsibility for overseeing all significant fair value measurements, including Level 3 fair values, and reports directly to the Board of Directors.

The CFO regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as broker quotes or pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the CFO assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of IFRS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified. Significant valuation issues are reported to the Board of Directors.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses market observable data as far as possible. Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

· Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability might be categorised in different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

### 7 Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

#### (a) Revenue

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Revenue primarily represents the sales value of electricity and other related energy services supplied to customers during the year and excludes Value Added Tax. The Company generally recognizes revenue upon delivery of goods to customers on purchases, or upon completion of services rendered. Delivery is deemed complete when the risks and rewards associated with ownership have been transferred to the buyer as contractually agreed i.e the electricity has been consumed by the customers, compensation has been contractually established and collection of the resulting receivable is probable. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue from the sale of electricity to postpaid customers is the value of the volume of units supplied during the year including an estimate of the value of volume of units supplied to these customers between the date of their last meter reading (which coincides with the last invoice date) and the year-end. In case of prepaid meter customers, an estimate is made for unearned revenue as at year-end and this is included in the statement of financial position as deferred revenue.

In line with the applicable tariff framework, prices charged by the Company for electricity distribution are regulated. However, the Company is allowed to recover excess costs incurred through future price increases charged on future deliveries. Similarly, where current regulated rates are determined to be excessive, the Company may be subject to a rate reduction in the future against future deliveries. The Company does not recognise an asset or liability, as the case may be, on account of under-recovery or over-recovery except where it is obligated to provide future services at a loss in which case a provision is recognised. Revenue from rendering of services is recognised when such services are rendered.

The Company receives transfers of certain items of PPE from customers. The Company assesses whether the transferred item meets the definition of an asset, and if so recognizes the transferred asset as PPE. At initial recognition, the asset is measured at fair value, and a corresponding amount is recognized as revenue when the Company has no future performance obligations.

### (b) Finance income and finance costs

Finance income comprises interest income on short-term deposits with banks. Interest income on short-term deposits is recognised using the effective interest method.

Finance costs comprise interest expense on interest bearing borrowings. Borrowing costs that are not directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets are recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

### (c) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated to the functional currency of the Company at exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated to the functional currency (Nigerian Naira) using the exchange rate at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated to the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Foreign currency differences are generally recognised in profit or loss. Non-monetary items that are measured based on historical cost in foreign currency are not translated.

### (d) Property, plant and equipment

### i Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management including relevant borrowing costs.

Contributions by customers of items of property, plant and equipment, which require an obligation to supply goods to the customer in the future, are recognised at the fair value when the Company has control of the item. The Company assesses whether the transfered item meets the definition of an asset, and if so recognizes the transfered asset as PPE. At initial recognition, its cost is measured at fair value, and a corresponding amount is recognised as income when the Company has no future performance obligations. If the Company is yet to discharge the future performance obligation, the corresponding amount is recognised as a deferred income pending the performance of the obligation.

Assets under construction are stated at cost which includes cost of materials and direct labour and any costs incurred in bringing it to its present location and condition.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in profit or loss.

### ii Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset as appropriate, only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the profit or loss during the financial period in which they are incurred.

#### iii Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment less their estimated residual values using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives, and is generally recognised in profit or loss. Leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives unless it is reasonably certain that the Company will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term.

#### (e) Intangible assets

Intangible assets with finite useful lives that are acquired separately are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Acquired computer software licences are capitalized on the basis of costs incurred to acquire and bring the specific software to the useful

#### Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

#### Amortization

Amortization is calculated to write-off the cost of intangible assets less the estimated residual values using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives and is generally recognized in profit or

### (f) Financial instruments

The Company classifies non-derivative financial assets as loans and receivables.

The Company classifies non-derivative financial liabilities into the other financial liabilities category.

(i) Non-derivative financial assets and financial liabilities - recognition and derecognition The Company initially recognises loans and receivables on the date when they are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised on the trade date.

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred, or it neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and does not retain control over the transferred asset. Any interest in such derecognised financial assets that is created or retained by the Company is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

The Company derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Loans and receivables

These assets are initially recognised at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. They are included in current assets, except for non-trade receivables that have maturities greater than 12 months after the end of the reporting period. These are classified as non-current assets.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

In the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

## (ii) Non-derivative financial liabilities - measurement

Non-derivative financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value less any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, these liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### (g) Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories is based on weighted average cost. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated selling expenses. Allowance is made for obsolete, slow-moving or defective items where appropriate. Inventories are stated net of write-down and provisions.

## (i) Determining whether an arrangement contains a lease

At inception of an arrangement, the Company determines whether such an arrangement is or contains a lease. At inception or on reassessment of the arrangement, the Company separates payments and other consideration required by such an arrangement into those for the lease and those for other elements on the basis of their relative fair values. If the Company concludes for a finance lease that it is impracticable to separate the payments reliably, then an asset and a liability are recognised at an amount equal to the fair value of the underlying asset. Subsequently the liability is reduced as payments are made and an imputed finance cost on the liability is recognised using the Company's

#### (ii) Leased assets

Assets held by the Company under leases that transfer to the Company substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. The leased assets are measured initially at an amount equal to the lower of their fair value and the present value of the minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy

#### (iii) Lease payments

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Minimum lease payments made under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the

#### (i) Impairment

### (i) Non-derivative financial assets

Financial assets are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired includes:

- · default or delinquency by a debtor;
- · restructuring of an amount due to the Company on terms that the Company would not consider
- · indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy;
- · adverse changes in the payment status of borrowers or issuers.

## Financial assets measured at amortised cost

The Company considers evidence of impairment for these assets at both an individual asset and a collective level. All individually significant assets are individually assessed for impairment. Those found not to be impaired are then collectively assessed for any impairment that has been incurred but not yet individually identified. Assets that are not individually significant are collectively assessed for impairment. Collective assessment is carried out by grouping together assets with similar risk

In assessing collective impairment, the Company uses historical information on the timing of recoveries and the amount of loss incurred, and makes an adjustment if current economic and credit conditions are such that the actual losses are likely to be greater or lesser than suggested by historical

An impairment loss is calculated as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the estimated recoverable amount. Losses are recognised in profit or loss and reflected in an allowance account. When the Company considers that there are no realistic prospects of recovery of the asset, the relevant amounts are written off. If the amount of impairment loss subsequently decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, then the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss.

### (ii) Non-financial assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its non-financial assets (other than inventories and deferred tax assets) to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

For impairment testing, assets are grouped together into the smallest group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset or CGU. An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

### (j) Employee benefits

## (i) Short term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed as the related service is provided.

A liability is recognized for the amount expected to be paid if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee, and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

### (ii) Defined contribution plan

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Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are expensed as the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognized as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or reduction in future payments is available.

The Company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Staff contributions to the scheme amount to 8% of the employee's basic salary, housing and transport allowances which are funded through payroll deductions while the Company's contribution of 10% of the employee's basic salary, housing and transport allowances is recognised in profit or loss as employee benefit expense in the periods during which services are rendered by employees.

### (iii) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are expensed at the earlier of when the Company can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits and when the Company recognises costs for a restructuring. If benefits are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting period, then they are discounted.

## (k) Provisions and contingent liabilities

#### Provisions

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognized as finance cost.

A provision for restructuring is recognized when the Company has approved a detailed and formal restructuring plan, and the restructuring either has commenced or has been announced publicly. Future operating losses are not provided for.

A provision for onerous contracts is recognized when the expected benefits to be derived by the Company from a contract are lower than the unavoidable cost of meeting its obligations under the contract. The provision is measured at the present value of the lower of the expected cost of terminating the contract and the expected net cost of continuing with the contract. Before a provision is established, the Company recognizes any impairment loss on the assets associated with that contract.

#### Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company; or a present obligation that arises from past events but is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability.

Contingent liabilities are only disclosed and not recognized as liabilities in the statement of financial position.

If the likelihood of an outflow of resources is remote, the possible obligation is neither a provision nor a contingent liability and no disclosure is made.

#### (I) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination, or items recognised directly in equity or in OCI.

#### (i) Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. It is measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

The Company is subject to the Companies Income Tax Act (CITA). Total amount of tax payable under CITA is determined based on the higher of two components namely Company Income Tax (based on taxable income (or loss) for the year; and Minimum tax (determined based on the sum of the highest of 0.25% of revenue of N500,000, 0.5% of gross profit, 0.25% of paid up share capital and 0.5% of net assets; and 0.125% of revenue in excess of N500,000). Taxes based on taxable profit for the period are treated as income tax in line with IAS 12; whereas Minimum tax which is based on a gross amount is outside the scope of IAS 12 and therefore not presented in the income tax expense line item in profit or loss.

Where the minimum tax charge is higher than the Company Income Tax, a hybrid tax situation exists. In this situation, the CIT is recognized in the income tax expense line in profit or loss and the excess amount is presented above the income tax line as Minimum tax.

#### (ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax losses, unused tax credits and deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only if certain criteria are met.

### (m) Share capital

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#### Ordinary shares

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of ordinary shares, net of any tax effects, are recognised as a deduction from equity.

#### (n) Statement cash flows

The statement of cash flows is prepared using the indirect method. Changes in statement of financial position items that have not resulted in cash flows such as fair value changes and other non-cash items, have been eliminated for the purpose of preparing the statement. Finance costs paid is also included in financing activities while finance income is included in investing activities.

It replaces existing revenue recognistion guidance, including IAS 18 Revenue, IAS 11 Construction Contracts and IFRIC 13 Customer Loyalty Programmes. IFRS 15 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2017, with early adoption permitted.

IFRS 16 Leases

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IFRS 16 replaces IAS 17 Leases, IFRIC 4 Determining whether an Arrangement contains a Lease, SIC-15 Operating Leases – Incentives and SIC-27 Evaluating the Substance of Transactions Involving the Legal Form of a Lease. The standard sets out the principles for the recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure of leases for both parties to a contract, i.e. the customer ('lessee') and the supplier ('lessor'). IFRS 16 eliminates the classification of leases as operating leases or finance leases as required by IAS 17 and introduces a single lessee accounting model. Applying that model, a lessee is required to recognise:

- (a) assets and liabilities for all leases with a term of more than 12 months, unless the underlying asset is of low value; and
- (b) depreciation of lease assets separately from interest on lease liabilities in the profit or loss.

For the lessor, IFRS 16 substantially carries forward the lessor accounting requirements in IAS 17. Accordingly, a lessor continues to classify its leases as operating leases or finance leases, and to account for those two types of leases differently. The Company are yet to carry out an assessment to determine the impact that the initial application of IFRS 16 could have on its business; however, the Company will adopt the standard for the year ending 31 December 2019.

IFRC 22 Foreign currency transactions and advance consideration

The amendments provide guidance on the transaction date to be used in determining the exchange rate for translation of foreign currency transactions involving an advance payment or receipt.

The amendments clarifies that the transaction date is the date on which the Company initially recognises the prepayment or deferred income arising from the advance consideration. For transactions involving multiple payments or receipts, each payment or receipt gives rise to a separate transaction date. IFRIC 22 is effective 1 January 2018 with early adoption permitted.

#### (c) Consultancy fees

Included in consultancy fees are fees amounting to №3.09 billion (2014: №2.40 billion), which relate to a technical support services agreement between the Company and WPG Services Limited (WSL). Based on the agreement, the services covered include provision of local, top level and expatriate staff to enable EKEDP meet the performance standard in the Performance Agreement entered into with BPE. (Note 26(b)) which were provided by WSL. The fee is a fixed amount of \$15 million (№3.09 billion) per annum.

### (d) Imbalance deductions

Imbalance deductions represent reductions which accrued to the Company for receiving less energy from the national grid than its MYTO 2 allocation of 11% during the year. Due to energy generation and transmission grid inadequacy affecting the industry, energy made available into the grid has been allocated among all distribution companies on an easily understandable basis by NERC over a 5-year period from 2012 to 2016 financial year (EKEDP's energy allocation per MYTO is 11%). The MYTO also provides for a mechanism whereby in the event that a distribution company is unable to absorb its allocated energy, such energy will be allocated to other distribution companies. An order (Order No. NERC/139) dated 30 July 2015 was issued to amend the MYTO provisions of imbalance penalty/deductions. Hence, a company taking delivery of excess energy will no longer be penalized, while a company taking delivery of less energy will be compensated by the Transmission Service Provider if the inability to take such delivery is due to transmission constraints. On the other hand, if the inability to take delivery of allocated energy is due to constraints on its network, the distribution company will not be entitled to any compensation.

#### (a) Customer loan (CAPMI)

This represents amounts received from customers with respect to procurement of meters in line with the Credit Advanced Payment for Metering Implementation (CAPMI) scheme initiated by NERC and implemented by the Company in the prior year. The tenor for the individual loans vary from 12 months to 36 months at an interest rate of 12% per annum. The loans are to be repaid through monthly deductions from the fixed charge component of energy billings to

Interest expense for the year amounted to №88.97 million (2014: №42.16 million).

(b) Loan from related party - West Power and Gas Ltd

Under the terms and conditions of the loan agreement between the Company and West Power and Gas Ltd, its parent company, the Company has access to a total amount of \$145 million to finance working capital and capital expenditure requirements. The line available for working capital requirements is \$20 million while \$125 million is available to be drawn for capital expenditure requirements. The loan is to disbursed in Naira and US Dollar in a ratio of 30:70.

The loan is secured on an all asset debenture charge over fixed and floating assets of the Company as well as all cash flows and revenues accruing to the Company from all electricity distributed to end users and off-takers. The loan amount is available through a facility obtained by West Power and Gas Ltd from a commercial bank. The commercial bank also has an all asset debenture charge over the fixed and floating assets of the Company as well as a charge on the Company's cash flows.

The working capital and capital expenditure loans are repayable after a moratorium of 6 months and 1 year respectively from drawdown date. Interest is repayable monthly during the respective moratorium periods. Interest is payable at 19% per annum for Naira drawdowns and LIBOR plus margin of 8.5% per annum, subject to a floor of 11% per annum for US Dollar drawdowns.

During the year, \$9.46 million (№1.52 billion) was drawn down on the loan. Interest expense for the year amounted to №360.79 million (2014: №156.31 million).

#### (c) CBN - NEMSF Intervention Fund

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The Central Bank of Nigeria commenced disbursement to market participants who have met the condition precedent to the disbursement of the CBN-Nigerian Electricity Market Stabilization Facility ("CBN-NEMSF"). The NEMSF, also known as the CBN Intervention fund, amounting to \$\frac{1}{2}\$13 billion, is aimed at settling the outstanding payment obligations due to the market participants during the Interim Rules Period ("IRP Debts") as well as the legacy gas debt of the PHCN generation companies owed to gas suppliers ("Legacy Gas Debt") which has been transferred to the Nigerian Electricity Liability Management Company Limited by Guarantee ("NELMCO"). The loans are repayable over a 10-year period, with a 1 year moratorium on the principal repayment beginning from the date of first disbursement. Interest is payable on outstanding loan balances at an interest rate of 10%. During the year, The Company received three (3) tranches amounting to \$\frac{1}{2}\$5.21 billion. Amount disbursed to legacy gas suppliers during the year by NESI Stabilization Strategy Limited was \$\frac{1}{2}\$64.23 million. Interest expense for the

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#### Transfer of pre-completion liabilities and trade receivables

As part of the privatisation completion, the Company through the Bureau of Public Enterprises signed a deed of assignment of pre-completion receivables and liabilities with the Nigerian Electricity Management Company Limited (NELMCO) effective 31 October 2013. The Company and NELMCO are yet to agree on the individual trade debtors and liabilities transferred as at 1 November 2013. The Directors, based on independent legal advice obtained as well as their understanding of the Share Purchase Agreement between West Power and Gas Ltd, BPE and the Ministry of Finance Incorporated are of the opinion that all liabilities (crystallised or contingent) as at 31 October 2013 have been effectively transferred. The Company does not have an estimate of those debtors and liabilities since in its view this is the responsibility of NELMCO. The Company believes that it will neither realise those receivables nor settle any liabilities existing as at 31 October 2013 and as such, no recognition of provision is required other than that recognized in prior year (Note 25). If in the process of agreeing the individual trade debtors and liabilities, certain items are identified and agreed to be borne by the Company, the amounts would be recorded in the period they were identified.

#### (b) Litigations and claims

The Company is involved in certain litigations and claims (separate from those taken over by NELMCO). Maximum exposure based on the damages being claimed by the litigants amounts to №5.32 million (2014: №6.32 million). #### 30 Events after the reporting date

#### (a) Tariff increase

MYTO 2015

Effective 1 February 2016, the Company initiated the implementation of the MYTO 2015 EKEDP tariff order released on 21 December 2015. The order abolishes the fixed charge element of the previous tariff rates and only allows a variable charge. The fixed charge has now been built into the variable tariff determination model. The MYTO 2015 tariff results in an average increase of 29% in 2016 tariff over 2015 tariff rates across all customer categories. There have been continuous objections to the increased rates by Labour Unions and other stakeholders, but as at the approval of these financial statements, the rates are still in force.

#### (b) CBN floating of currency

On 20 June 2016, the Central Bank of Nigeria released its revised guidelines for the operation of the Nigerian inter-bank foreign exchange market which removed the ceiling on the exchange rate of №196.50 to the United States Dollar (USD). This resulted in a significant weakening of the Naira against the major currency, USD by approximately 42%. The Company's major foreign exchange balances are held in loans and borrowings and

The Company has assessed the impact of the revised guidelines on its currency exposure. As at 31 December 2015, the Company's net exposure was \$16.71 million (№4.63 billion) (See Note 28(c)). If the rate of exchange as at date of issue of the financial statements of №484:\$1 were applied, this would have been valued at №8.09 billion, representing a 75% increase in the net liability with a foreign exchange loss of №3.50 billion recognized

#### (c) Wind down of CAPMI Scheme

Subsequent to year end, NERC in a circular dated 25 August 2016 issued a directive on the wind down of the CAPMI scheme. The scheme which commenced in May 2013 was designed to assist distribution companies with easy meter financing from customers as well as encourage mass roll out of meters. However, due to the inability of the distribution companies to meet the aforementioned objectives, NERC has therefore slated the deadline for the wind down of the scheme as 1 November 2016. In view of this, all customers that have paid for meters are expected to be metered within 60 days of issuance of the directive (latest 30 October 2016).
